The Village of Hoffman Estates is a proud supporter of the Golden Corridor Advanced Manufacturing Partnership (GCAMP).

The Huntington 90 business park along the I-90 “Golden Corridor” is home to several advanced manufacturers in Hoffman Estates

This group of regional employers, educational institutions, local governments and other stakeholders is working together to promote careers in the growing advanced manufacturing industry near Hoffman Estates along the Jane Addams Memorial Tollway – also known as the “Golden Corridor.”

GCAMP helped establish a Robotics Club at Harper College, which is comprised of students associated with the Harper Society of Engineers and Harper Manufacturing and Welding. For a February 2018 competition, members are designing a functional 60- to 85-pound robot from scratch! Challenges like this help students translate academic learning into real-world applications using physics, geometry, trigonometry and algebra.

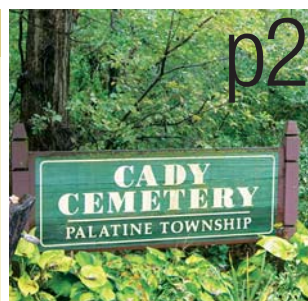
GCAMP is awarding over \$20,000 in grants to local middle schools and high schools in 2017-2018 with the intent of involving more students in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM)-related activities and competitions.

These students also have the chance to learn about careers in the field of advanced manufacturing – exciting, high-tech jobs that provide an opportunity to work with their hands and use creative problem-solving skills in a team environment.

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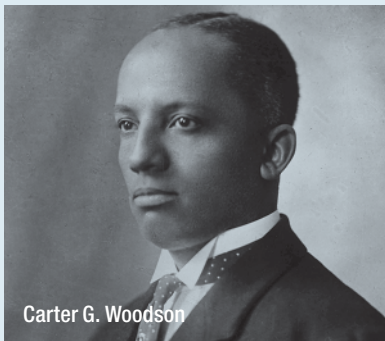
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Black History Month celebration

Black History Month is an outgrowth of Negro History Week, an event created in 1926 by Carter G. Woodson, an African-American scholar and historian. In 1976, the annual event was extended to last for one month, during which achievements of African-Americans are honored.

Historian's notebook

There's a saying that what happens today is tomorrow's history. But we always think of history as things that happened a long time ago. That's the history we find so interesting. We have questions about things that happened in the past, and the detective work that's involved in finding those answers is what makes some of us history junkies.

This past summer, I received an email from a Hoffman Estates resident about an old tombstone that she found in her mother's home. It was a very unusual item to uncover amongst her antiquing mom's collection, and she didn't know what to do with it. How could she find information about a tombstone that simply said, "Wilson, December 20, 1856, 7 Yrs. 8 Mos."? This was a tombstone of a young child, and she needed to find where this child was buried so it could be returned to the grave.

The first person I turned to for help was Jane Rozek, history librarian at the Schaumburg Township District Library. She is a wonderful research librarian, and I knew she'd

be interested in helping solve the mystery of our resident's tombstone.

Jane began searching through census records for Schaumburg Township. Finding nothing for a young Wilson, she sought help from Marilyn Pedersen, historian with the Palatine Historical Society. Marilyn said that the Wilsons were a prominent Palatine family. She suggested two books that might help in our search: "Pioneer Cemeteries of Palatine Township" and "Hillside Cemetery." The library has a great local history collection, and those two books were on the shelf! Jane discovered that the tombstone belonged to the grave of Mary Emily Wilson, who was buried in the Cady Cemetery in Inverness.

Our Hoffman Estates resident was amazed that the young child's resting place was found. She never knew how her mother acquired the tombstone; she just knew she had to get it back to little Mary Emily's grave. She called Terry Kelly, chairman of the Cemetery Committee in

Palatine Township, and they came out and picked it up. The Stonehuggers, a group that volunteers their services to repair and replace tombstones in the old cemeteries of our area, would get it back to the child's grave.

On Nov. 27, the resident got word that Mary Emily's tombstone was back in its rightful place. She went out to the cemetery. It was a very emotional visit for her. The peace and quiet of the old Cady Cemetery inspired her to volunteer to plant some flowers or help in other ways to maintain the cemetery. Her only sadness was that Mary Emily Wilson does not have her first name on the 1856 tombstone.

This amazing story and its happy ending are due to good records kept by the Wilson family, as well as the preservation of these records by the Palatine Historical Society. A missing piece of history was put back in place. It's incredible that an 1856 tombstone can be replaced in 2017. Mary Emily now rests in peace.

Responsible Pet Owners Month

February is Responsible Pet Owners Month. The Village requires that pet owners obtain a license for each indoor and outdoor dog and cat they own. Pet tags expire on Oct. 31 each year, and can be obtained at the Village Hall for \$5 each (\$2 for senior citizens for the first three pets). A current rabies tag number and expiration date is needed to register. For more information, call 847-882-9100. The pet license application can also be found at www.hoffmanestates.org/petlicenses.

Regularly check your pet's collar and leash for any wear and tear, and make sure all tags are still legible and current. Finally, check your fence and gates for damage that may have been caused by the winter weather. Changing temperatures and precipitation can shift soil and create gaps that allow curious pets to escape. If your pet regularly spends time in the backyard, a five-minute check of your fence is a quick and easy way to ensure they are safe.

No FROG, No Clog

The Water and Sewer Division of the Village's Public Works Department offers tips to properly dispose of fats, rags, oils and grease (FROG) – think "No FROG, No Clog."



Pouring leftover cooking grease down the drain can cause damage to both household plumbing and water resources. The following tips may help eliminate FROG from our waste water system:

- Throw bulky waste materials in the trash
- Freeze small amounts of fats, oils and grease in a tightly sealed container, and dispose in the trash
- Mix cooking oil with an absorbent material, such as cat litter or coffee grounds, place in a tightly sealed container and dispose in the trash
- Scrape and wipe grease from pans/dishes with a paper towel before washing
- Prewash dishes and pans with cold water before they go in the dishwasher
- Use a strainer in your sink to catch scraps
- Cover drains with a fine screen/catch basket, and empty into the trash
- Use environmentally safe cleaning products instead of harsh detergents or cleaners that can damage sewer lines

You should never pour grease down the garbage disposal, even if you use hot water with a grease-fighting detergent. Home garbage disposals do not remove grease from the plumbing system. Additionally, hot water will cool down in pipes causing fats and grease to coagulate, which creates blockages farther down the pipeline.

PUT A FREEZE ON WINTER FIRES

Home fires occur more in winter than in any other season. As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, **be fire smart!**

Half of all home heating fires occur in the months of



Heating equipment is involved in **1** in every **7** reported **home fires** and **1** in every **5** home fire deaths.

Keep anything that can burn at least **3 feet from any heat source** like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators, or space heaters.

Keep portable generators outside, away from windows, and **as far away as possible from your home.**

Install and test carbon monoxide alarms at least **once a month.**



Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents **every year.**



Store cooled ashes in a tightly covered metal container, and keep it outside at least

10 feet from your home and any nearby buildings.

Plug only **1** heat-producing appliance (such as a space heater) into an electrical outlet at a time.

Don't bury critical equipment
